## FOREWORD

This eleventh issue of the CNSSAP Statistical Information Bulletin is a snapshot of the activities of our institution as carried out in the first quarter of the 2023 financial year.

The statistical information highlighted in this bulletin mainly concerns contributions, benefits, the financial situation and human resources.

Highlights of this issue are as followed.

- The CNSSAP contributor population stood at 203 097 in the first quarter of 2023, an increase of 2.4% compared to the last quarter of 2022 ;
- From a geographical point of view, the city-province of Kinshasa retains the bulk of the workforce with 41.44% of insured contributors (i.e. 84 163), while administratively, the health sector is still in the lead with 24.7% of affiliates (i.e. 50 112) ;
- The breakdown by grade shows that first class administration officers (AO'1) have the highest number with a rate of 24.8%. They are followed by second-class administrative officers who represent 19.1%. Bailiffs have the lowest proportion, i.e. 0.8% ;
- Total registered active agents (career agents only), since the start of the campaign in 2017, reached 119 688 agents at the end of the period under analysis. In terms of sex, men represent 69.86%, while women account for 30.14% ;
- The pure distribution rate fell from 5.45% in 2022 to 7.30% in the first quarter of 2023 ;
- All other things being equal, the optimal replacement demographic ratio, for the CNSSAP scheme, is 12 new recruits and/or mechanized workers for 1 retired worker. This proportion was 6 at the end of 2022 ;
- The classic paid retired workforce increased from 1 329 in 2022 to 2 768 in the first quarter of 2023, a jump of 108.3% ;
- The city-province of Kinshasa has 64.1% of the classic paid retired workforce ;
- As for the insured beneficiaries of the changeover reform, 12 546 were paid, including 4212 direct retirees and 8 334 reserve owners (spouses and orphans) ;
- Regarding the performance indicators, they all complied with the required standards.

**DEFINITIONS OF MAIN CONCEPTS**

Affiliation	: Attachment of the public official to the social security system established both in terms of his obligations (contributions) and in terms of his rights (benefits).
Annuity	: Percentage of the reference salary used to calculate the pension that the insured person acquires per year of service.
Insured	: Public official affiliated to the contributory social security scheme established by law.
Cotizapp	: CNSSAP mobile application allowing insured contributors to consult in real time the evolution of their individual contributor accounts and to simulate the amount of their future retirement pension.
Social contributions	: Periodic compulsory deductions imposed on public officials and the State-employer, intended to finance the social security system instituted in their favor.
Registration	: Administrative procedure, by which a social security body identifies its taxable persons, records them in its books and assigns each a social security number.
Retirement pension	: Allowance paid periodically to public officials admitted to retirement.
Service provider	: Beneficiary of a service provided by the CNSSAP.
Social Security benefits	: Benefits in cash or in kind that social protection institutions pay to their beneficiaries.
Demographic ratio	: Index that shows the number of contributors it takes to support the pension of a retiree.
Survivor's pension	: Allowance paid to survivors of a deceased taxable person.

13. *Staff expense ratio* =  $\frac{\text{Personnel expenses}}{\text{Operating expenses}}$
14. *Ratio of net income* =  $\frac{\text{Net income}}{\text{Contributions}}$


