FOREWORD

This issue of the CNSSAP Statistical Information Bulletin is a quantified snapshot of our institution's activities as they took place in the second quarter of 2022. The key points to remember are broken down as follows:

- The number of CNSSAP contributors increased by 12.2% compared to 2021. They stood at 192 044 in the second quarter of 2022, from 171 185 at the end of 2021.
- Geographically, Kinshasa remains the modal province with 40.8% of the workforce, while administratively; the health sector remains in the lead with 25.6% of insured.
- The total of registered active agents, since the start of the campaign in 2017, stands at the end of June 2022 at 91 878 people. Men account for 66.6%, while women account for 33.4%.
- As for retirees, their number fell by 5.1% compared to the end of December 2021. Thus, the number of people receiving benefits increased by 7.6%. For the moment, the majority of retirees paid by the CNSSAP are from the public service, i.e. 44.2% of the total.
- With regard to performance indicators, they are globally in line with the required standards.

DEFINITIONS OF MAIN CONCEPTS

- Affiliation : Attachment of the public official to the social security system established both in terms of his obligations (contributions) and in terms of his rights (benefits).
- Annuity : Percentage of the reference salary used to calculate the pension that the insured person acquires per year of service.
- Insured : Public official affiliated to the contributory social security scheme established by law.
- Cotizapp : CNSSAP mobile application allowing insured contributors to consult in real time the evolution of their individual contributor accounts and to simulate the amount of their future retirement pension.
- Social contributions : Periodic compulsory deductions imposed on public officials and the State-employer, intended to finance the social security system instituted in their favor.
- Registration : Administrative procedure, by which a social security body identifies its taxable persons, records them in its books and assigns each a social security number.
- Retirement pension : Allowance paid periodically to public officials admitted to retirement.
- Service provider : Beneficiary of a service provided by the CNSSAP.
- Social Security benefits : Benefits in cash or in kind that social protection institutions pay to their beneficiaries.
- Demographic report : Index that shows the number of contributors it takes to support the pension of a retiree.
- Survivor's pension : Allowance paid to survivors of a deceased taxable person.

FORMULAS

1. Demographic report = $\frac{\text{Total contributors in t period}}{\text{Total retirees in t period}}$
2. Retirement pension = **Base salary * Replacement rate**
3. Replacement rate = **Number of years of service * Annuity rate**
4. Annuity rate = **1.33%***
5. Survivor's pension for the surviving spouse (deceased worker) = **Base salary * 25%#**
6. Survivor's pension for the surviving spouse (deceased retiree) = **Retirement pension * 50%#**
7. Survivor's pension for the orphan (deceased worker) = **Base salary * 4%#**
8. Survivor's pension for the orphan (deceased retiree) = **Retirement pension * 10% #**
9. Total income = **Technical products (or contributions) + Income on investment transaction**
10. Total charge = **Technical expenses (or benefits) + Operating expenses**
11. Administrative expense ratio = $\frac{\text{Operating expenses (minus depreciation)}}{\text{Total contributions}}$
12. Operating expense ratio = $\frac{\text{Operating expenses}}{\text{Total revenue}}$
13. Staff expense ratio = $\frac{\text{Personnel expenses}}{\text{Operating expenses}}$
14. Ratio of net income = $\frac{\text{Net income}}{\text{Contributions}}$
15. Reserve ratio = $\frac{\text{Amount of investments}}{\text{Amount of pensions}}$
16. Self – sufficiency ratio = $\frac{\text{Total income}}{\text{Total expenses}}$
